HIGHLIGHTS OF A "VIKING TRAIL" TOUR



Jane and I purchased our 34-foot Airstream Trailer in 1998. From 1998 to 2006, we visited the 49 continental states of the USA, and nine provinces and two territories of Canada. We didn't find our way to the Province of Newfoundland & Labrador until 2016. We had hoped to join a Viking Caravan in 2015 or 2016, but didn't succeed. We created our own Viking Caravan of one Airstream this year, using a borrowed 2015 Drivers Manual to plan our trip. A 14-year old grandson came aboard to share the trip!

Along the route, we stopped at *Hopewell Rocks* on the west side of the Bay of Fundy, a expansive display of relatively soft reddish brown stone outcroppings, shaped over time by the surging Fundy tides. This was our grandson's favorite stop, as he couldn't conceive of spring tide changes exceeding 40 feet in height, or of walking on the ocean floor at such a low tide.

We crossed the Gulf of St. Lawrence from Nova Scotia on a Newfoundland Ferry carrying innumerable cars, RVs and 18-wheeler trucks, arriving at Port aux Basques, NL nearly eight hours later. A thirty-mile drive then took us to our first stop, a beautifully landscaped campground at Doyles, NL. We stayed at Grand Codroy RV Camping for four nights, making daytime trips in the lightly settled rural area, including *Cape Anguilla Lighthouse*, nearby, the *Rose Blanche Lighthouse* on the southern coast of NL. The latter is a stone structure faithfully restored by artisans in a community which sits on a particularly remote point of land. Certainly worth the side trip!

Our next stop was *Gros Morne National Park*, a three-hour drive up the western shore of Newfoundland, along the Labrador Strait. We stayed in the Park in a KOA campground for six nights, enjoying kayaking, hiking and bicycling. My understanding of Gros Morne grew in reading a well-written and highly informative guide to the park's geology and ecology, about the unique history of the area and of informative, longer hikes into the Tablelands Section of the Park. I would like to make a second trip to Newfoundland, just to explore the park.

Our following stop was near *St. Anthony*, at the northwestern tip of the island. We visited the excavated ruins site and the replicated village of the original Viking settlement *at L'Anse aux Meadows*, which was first visited by Norwegians from Greenland around A.D. 1000. Again, purchase of a book offered far more to absorb than a mere visit to the visitors center. The Norwegian archeologist who excavated the site in the 1960s under a grant from National Geographic Society wrote a book in Norwegian, recently translated into English, which integrated her exploration of the site with her experience living six summers in a community then effectively isolated except by sea from St. Anthony or neighboring towns.

Botwood, a waypoint on our route to Gander, is near a large lake which was a landing and refueling point for the BOAC and PanAm transatlantic Flying Boats of the pre- and post-WWII propeller era, as well as for Allied Air Forces during WWII. The museum offers a B&W newsreel-type film of the first pair of flying boat transatlantic flights, east and west, which stopped there. A smaller Flying Boat is on display at dockside.

Gander (Country Inn RV Park) has relatively good weather and visibility, which makes it the home of *Gander International Airport*. That airport was the location from which Arrow Air 1285, a DC-8 contract flight, failed to make a successful departure with returning US 101st Airborne troops, crashing and burning with over 250 deaths in December 1985. The *Silent Witness Memorial* is a monument to the 101st Airborne personnel on the doomed flight, which crashed less than ½-mile from the end of its runway.

Bonavista, a town on the northeastern coast, was the landing point for John Cabot, who sailed into the area in the 13th century. An accurate replica of his ship awaits visitors, as does an historic lighthouse, seascapes, etc. Local camping accommodations were rough and scarce, requiring extended drives from a campground on the TransCanada Highway, which severely limited our sightseeing in Bonavista and Trinity Bay.

St. John's, capital of Newfoundland & Labrador, is a busy town with many sightseeing opportunities on its peripheries. Pippy Park Campground, in a city park of the same name, is centrally located, and comfortable. We visited the Geo Center, an underground museum with local geological features of interest as well as topical displays, including a damning display of information related to the loss of the Titanic – off the east coast of Newfoundland, including design and construction short-cuts which compromised the hull, and the Captain's supreme overconfidence about iceberg peril. My grandson and I also went to the eastern-most point of North American, named "Cape Spear" due to the shape of the point of land. We saw the original and current lighthouses, despite drenching rain! (I returned for pictures on a sunny day!)

WBCCI's Viking Trail Caravans usually returned to Nova Scotia by overnight ferry from Argentia, near St. John. After putting our grandson on a plane for Newark to meet his family for a summer's end vacation, we reversed our route on the TransCanada Highway, returning to Port aux Basques for the day boat to Nova Scotia.


